HAIRE out — MyFeock in!

It was Geoffrey Chaucer who originally said that all good things must come to an end. Started in January 2020 funded by Europe Interreg 2 Seas and Feock Parish Council, HAIRE sought to reduce isolation and loneliness and improve the well being in the 60+ age group. The aim was to learn from local people about their needs and concerns and then to build on what already existed and support new developments and activities. HAIRE stands for Healthy Ageing in Rural Europe and is all about the well-being of people. The project came to an end in March 2023 but not before it had influenced the thinking of the Parish Council as it re-examined its role regarding community support. There will be a HAIRE legacy, the MyFeock service.

The HAIRE team led by Cllr Keith Hambly-Staite had the time to listen to the needs of people. One of the important lessons learnt was the need people had for up to date information about services and activities in the area. Communication was important and someone consistently being available to help was clearly significant.

After lots of consultation it was agreed to consolidate the 'helpline' in the parish office. This has now been complimented by a new community directory which is available on our wellbeing website MyFeock, with activities advertised in numerous ways, using both traditional posters, word of mouth and social media. Our aim is to provide a service that is reliable, up to date, consistent and one that is trusted.

Most importantly, with the evidence of need and with the financial support of Feock Parish Council, the lights will not be turned off at the end of the HAIRE project. The role of one of the team, Cathy Whitmore, has been made permanent and each morning her friendly voice will be heard at the end of the telephone in the Parish Council Office as she continues to help people and coordinate future activities.

Sadly, as projects end, people do move on to other things, and we will be losing our Project Co-ordinator, Bex Rawbone. She has created many activities and services throughout a very challenging time, as for much of the lifetime of HAIRE we had to deal with Covid! Bex has brought enormous energy, commitment and devotion to the project. She really cared and will be missed sorely by the many who saw her as the 'face of HAIRE'. We offer our warmest best wishes for her future endeavours.

Although the project has ended it has a legacy, a 'helpline' supported by a member of staff committed to helping people. Our new website MyFeock will support this activity. All residents of the parish are encouraged to visit the website to keep up to date with information about what's on in the Parish with sign-posting on where they can get help.

For the whole of the project Feock has been supported by a team at the University of Exeter led by Professor Kate Leyshon, and internally none of it would have happened without the support of the Parish Clerk, Debra Roberts and the Assistant Clerk, Debbie Searle, procedural and financial matters have been their forte and a debt of gratitude is owed to them for their commitment and hard work.

Kelly Stevens who wrote a blog on HAIRE for the University of Exeter wrote recently about a celebration event held at Trelissick Gardens for the many volunteers who took part in HAIRE at some time during the past three years. The role of vol-

unteers is often underestimated and sometimes undervalued. For HAIRE they were the bedrock of its success and we owe all those who take part in supporting community events a debt of gratitude.

It was pleasing that at an international conference in Ghent, Belgium in February, Feock Parish Council was complimented on its approach to helping with the issues of loneliness and isolation. It was observed that a Parish Council will now be seen as being more relevant to its local community having in the past been seen only in regard to footpaths and planning. Working with partners in the health sector it is hoped that the Parish Council can now ensure that its residents are more resilient and their wellbeing better supported.

Precept 2023/24

The Parish Council set their budget in December 2022 and agreed an increase to the precept (Council tax) of 2.62% which equates to an increase for a Band D household of £1.76 per year or 15p a month. The Parish Council continues to work to provide improvements to facilities across the Parish:

Recently we have installed new goal posts in the Pengelly Meadows Recrea-

tion Area and there will soon be a new goal in Devoran Recreation Area too; the **replacement** of a number of awkward stiles on our footpaths with new kissing gates to make them more accessible; **improved** signage on the public rights of way; **continued funding** for the helpline service and MyFeock wellbeing website which has been put in place from our HAIRE Wellbeing Project (more about this in the HAIRE update earlier in this newsletter); **provided** a Warm Hub for residents over the winter months; **installed** new grit and litter bins across the parish and have also co-ordinated the **installation** of memorial benches. The Parish Council are mindful that they need to keep enough funds in reserve to cover the large increase they will have this year in energy costs and have tried hard to keep the precept increase to a minimum as they are aware of the cost of living crisis affecting residents.

All residents are welcome to attend the Electors Meeting and Parish Council Meetings and raise any issues they wish. There will also be annual reports from the Chair of the Council and Chairs of the Council's sub Committees and our Cornwall Councillor, Martyn Alvey. The agendas for both meetings will be displayed on the website and noticeboards prior to the meeting.

Why not come along to these meetings to find out more about how the Parish Council works and what it does — we currently have two vacancies on the Parish Council, both in Feock ward—more details below.

Would you like to make a difference? Become a Councillor!

Feock Parish Council has two vacancies in the Feock ward for Parish Councillors, to be filled by co-option, if you are interested in joining a team looking after the Parish, please contact Debra, the Parish Clerk – see details below for more information and to request a copy of the co-option process (also available on our website under Policies)

There is so much to get involved in from reviewing planning applications, helping with making improvements to footpaths and recreation areas, highways issues and our wellbeing work to name but a few!

You will also be required to attend the Parish Council meetings which generally take place on the first or second Monday evening of the month in Devoran, you can also join other Committees such as Planning and Access & Amenities if you wish.

The criteria for becoming a Councillor is:

You must: be a UK or Commonwealth citizen; or be a citizen of the Republic of Ireland; or be a citizen of another Member state of the European Union (please contact the Clerk for clarification if you are a citizen of a Member state of the EU as the criteria changed on 01/01/21); and be at least 18 years old

To be eligible to stand for an election for a particular parish, you must: be an elector of the parish; or in the past 12 months have occupied (as owner or tenant) land or other premises in the parish; or work in the parish (as your principal or only place of work); or live within three miles of the parish boundary.

Please note, being a Parish Councillor is a voluntary position and we would recommend people who are interested attend a Parish Council meeting before applying to gain an understanding of the issues you will be involved with.

If you are interested in becoming a Parish Councillor, please send an email or letter of application explaining why you would like to join the Parish Council, what you can bring to the Council and any previous relevant experience to the Parish Clerk.

Feock Eco go up the creek

On a sunny March Saturday members of Feock Eco, launching from Point and Devoran on kayaks and paddle boards, paddled up the creek towards the Norway Inn.

Where the creek begins to run parallel with the A39 we found a shocking amount of rubbish, mainly on the banks between the road and the creek.

What did we find? Masses of single use plastic food packaging, bottles, cans, hub caps, bits of flooring, domestic plastic items, pipe lagging etc etc. So clearly stuff is chucked out of car windows and bigger items are left there by cars pulling in to one very small pull in area.

It is now widely known that rubbish, particularly plastic rubbish can be deadly for birdlife, and in our beautiful creek we have a prolific array of birds including geese, egrets, herons, waders, swans, ducks, buzzards to name just a few. The rubbish is also bad news for the fish and all life in our waterways





Sadly, until people decide that it is cruel to dump their rubbish rather than take it home or to the dump, then we need to collect it.

Devoran Pre-school 2023

I have been a Feock Parish councillor for 10 years but my "day job" is as an Early Years Educator. Tucked behind the Parish Council Office in the old School Hall is Devoran Pre-school. The Pre-school welcomes up to 30 children age between 2 and 4 years old every day.

The Pre-school moved from the Sunday School room at the Methodist Chapel in January 2014 to the School Hall in Market Street. This afforded us the opportunity to welcome more children for each session and to have a safe space dedicated to our use.

The children who attend come in the main from the Parish – from Carnon Downs, Devoran and Feock but also from further afield. I have worked as Manager of the Pre-school for nearly 18 years, all that time alongside Dawn. Now our first cohort of Pre-schoolers are in their early twenties and are students or working. Some of our alumni come back to work with us – some as part of their volunteering for D.O.E award and some for work experience. It is always a joy to welcome them back and see the wonderful young people they have become.

At Pre-school we have a dedicated team of seven caring Practitioners – including two Early Years Teachers so we are well equipped to help children "find their wings". We are the beginning of the learning journey for the children – we aim to use our lovely environment to give local children the best start in life and to prepare them for School.

We are so lucky to be in our premises – our main room used to be the School Hall. We feel very much part of the Community. We have the School Yard to play in and a gate to the Park. We can walk the children down to the Creek or up to the fields to look at the animals. We have very happy memories of Mr Holt taking the children bumping round his farm in his tractor trailer. We are grateful to the Johnson family for some growing space up at their field and we also have planters in the Yard. Last year we grew potatoes, broad beans, runner beans and flowers. We harvested, cooked and ate potatoes grown in the Yard for lunch!. and this year thanks to the generosity of Chacewater Garden centre we have a wonderful variety of seeds that we are planting and we will watch them grow.

This year we are looking forward to making memories with the children as we join in with the Coronation celebrations in the Parish.

We operate as a Committee managed registered charity and need to fundraise regularly. We are fortunate that the Devoran Quay Preservation Society let us have our regular Toffee Apple stall down on the Quay for the Firework display...all that sugar has paid for some amazing resources for the children over the years!

Apart from exploring the village and the Creek we enjoy trips out with the children – in recent years we have been to Newquay Zoo, to Castle Beach from Perranwell Station, to the Bodmin and Wenford railway to see Father Christmas all big adventures for little people.

Over the years we have developed a strong relationship with Devoran School, many of the Pre-schoolers go into Foundation. As the demographic in the area changes we are also seeing children going to other local schools, it has been a pleasure to get to know other Reception teachers when they come to visit their new children. It is a pleasure to live and work in the Parish. Our ties in the Community are strong and we appreciate that people are happy to have children in the very heart of the village.

The apple of my eye by John Lanyon

Head Gardener Trelissick, Glendurgan and Trerice

Apples have always been part of my life. Dad bought an old house in 1976 and in the garden there were some old apple trees: he invited a local "expert" home to advise him about apple pruning. From that moment onwards my love of apples and fruit developed.



Next, I went to be a student at the RHS garden Wisley, where I had a close shave with apples. We were split into groups and my group of three ended up in the orchard, one of the most complete collections in the country. We were destined to spend the winter pruning every apple tree in the freezing cold. But somehow I was moved into the tropical greenhouse! while my other 2 group members spent the winter apple pruning!

My time at Wisley allowed me to learn so much about how to grow fruit, train, prune and manage the whole range, which has been so useful.

Next I fondly remember my first stint at Trelissick and learning about the rich Cornish heritage linked to both Trelissick and the parish for growing fruit. To this end, the then Head Gardener, Barry was keen to establish an orchard full of Cornish apples. I helped Barry graft the original trees that now make up the orchard at Trelissick we all know today. We were so apple mad that we even had a few trees left over, and we planted them along what was then a working farm track, just to the west of the Orchard.

Then around the millennium I became the Head Gardener at Cotehele where there was an established orchard. I also learnt about the incredible fruit industry that used to exist. To this end we were able to secure a grant from the local AONB to establish a Mother Orchard to preserve as many as possible of the local apples and cherries.

Now I am back at Trelissick, the opportunity to reinstate the walled fruit garden has come about. This will create a garden full of juicy wonders, we can all enjoy. The garden will include two of the most admired fruit plants of all time: The Cornish Gilliflower apple and Kea plums.



Do you want a village hall in Devoran in the future? The hall is looking for younger people to become involved to help the Hall survive. If there are no younger people coming on, ultimately as the current Trustees retire there will be no one to manage the Hall. It will then close and as a registered charity the building would have to be sold and the village would have no hall for the community. Please support your community hall.



The Parish Council runs the Feock local transport scheme where we have volunteer drivers who give local residents lifts within the Parish (or very close by) to appointments such as Doctors, Dentists or the Hairdressers.



The booking phone line, manned by Cathy, is open weekday mornings from 9.30am to 12.00 noon, please give us as much notice as possible (ideally 48 hours) although we appreciate with Doctors or Dentists this isn't always possible.

Our drivers are volunteers so are not always available at short notice but we will always do our best to arrange a lift. Our drivers are also able to pick up and deliver prescriptions from your Doctors Surgery.

We do ask for a small donation to cover the petrol costs for our drivers.

We are always looking for new volunteer drivers as we are only a small team—please get in touch with Cathy to find out more via the helpline.

Unfortunately we do not offer lifts to hospital, but the TAP service at Age UK do and can be contacted on 01872 223388 and again please give them as much notice as possible.

We do offer a shopping delivery service but this is limited to those who are housebound and have no other way of getting shopping. Cathy on the Helpline can also be contacted for advice about other local services and groups and signpost you to these.
